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A Look Back 100 Years: St. Charles' Connection to the Titanic By: Phil Johnson

Alice Berg Johnson, a St. Charles native, was on board the RMS Titanic with her two children that fateful night it sank into the Atlantic Ocean. After joining the exclusive club of Titanic survivors, she and her daughter became reluctant local celebrities. Alice, and later Eleanor, wrote and spoke about their experience on Titanic and Eleanor even met with movie director James Cameron about the Titanic film. Yet, it wasn¢t supposed to happen this way.



In 1911, months before the sinking,

Alice had received word that her father was seriously ill in Finland. Traveling by train to New York City, she was prepared for the journey across the Atlantic when she received word that her father had passed away. Faced with the choice of returning to Saint Charles or visiting with her grieving family in Finland, she chose to make the journey.


In April of 1912, after 9 months abroad, it was time to return to her husband, in St. Charles. Alice had arranged to travel by boat to New York from Southampton, England. However, the boatøs

coal workers were on strike, forcing her to purchase three 3rd class tickets on the maiden voyage of the White Star Lineøs õTitanicö.

Any other day, it might

have been a different boat, but today was not any other day. All was seemingly well on the night of April 14th, 1912. Alice, three year old Harold and one year old Eleanor were sleeping soundly in their cabin when Titanic took evasive measures to avoid collision with an iceberg. The measures failed, and the force of the ice tearing into Titanic¢s hull threw Harold to the floor. After the collision, a dining room steward came to their cabin and told them to wear their lifejackets because the ship was sinking.

Making their way to the lifeboat, Alice struggled to hear the instructions from Titanicos crew over the screams of other doomed passengers. Noticing that many lifeboats were already in the water, she rushed with Harold and Eleanor through crowds of panicking people to what may have been the last remaining lifeboat, collapsible õDö. After climbing in. strangers handed Alice her daughter. However, Harold



was still on Titanicøs deck, in the arms of Elin Braf while collapsible õDö was being lowered into the water. Elin, a new friend to Alice, was frightened and had refused a seat on the lifeboat. Hearing Aliceøs screams, a nearby man snatched Harold from Elinøs arms and tossed him over Titanicøs edge, and into the lifeboat.

Collapsible õDö drifted in the ocean for 5 hours before rescue by The Carpathia, where sailors gave Alice, Harold and Eleanor their shirts to wear on their cold feet. Upon arrival in New York, Alice wired her husband, Oscar, in St. Charles about their safe return. Oscar hadnøt

known about the coal strike in Southampton, and was shocked to discover his family had been on Titanic. He quickly left for New York to collect his family and bring them back to St. Charles.

Alice did not enjoy the attention she received after returning to St. Charles and spent much of the rest of her life avoiding speaking about the Titanic. After passing away in 1968, Alice was buried in North Cemetery in St. Charles.

The St. Charles Heritage Center Book Club has book discussion scheduled on **May 1**.


Join us as we discuss **The Sinking of the Eastland: America's Forgotten Tragedy,** by Jay Bonansinga.

On the morning of Saturday, July 15, 1915, the passenger steamer Eastland was filled to capacity with some 2,500 passengers aboard. The passengers were Western Electric employees, heading out for a joyous company picnic on the other side of Lake Michigan from their homes in the environs of Chicago, Illinois. As the ship prepared to cast off, it suddenly rolled over, taking some 844 men, women and children to their deaths. This is the story of the Eastland disaster, a horrifying catastrophe by any standard, and the worst disaster in Chicago's history.




